

Sheet'ka <u>K</u>'waan the Traditional Territory of Sitka Tribe of Alaska




### The "Pinnacles" and St. Lazaria

- ► Protected by an act of the Alaska State Board of Fish and the North Pacific Fisheries Management Council




#### Marine and Coastal Protected Areas Alaska




















# Traditional Hunting and Fishing in Alaska

- ▲ Alaska has 220+ federally recognized tribes
- ▲ 1 reservation BUT no treaties
- ▲ ANCSA Alaska Native Claims Settlement Act
- ★ was passed to settle aboriginal land claims, but did not address traditional hunting and fishing rights
- → basically to settle oil and it's transport question



#### **ANILCA**

- ▲ ANILCA Alaska National Interest Land Claims Act
- ▲ was passed to address these rights but not forever- and did not exclusively address Alaska Natives, but uses a "Rural" designation



- ▲ "Subsistence" from ANILCA-
  - ▲ Feds took over management of Subsistence on Federal Lands in 2000
  - ▲ This established the Federal Subsistence Board and local Regional Advisory councils
  - ▲ Southeast has the Southeast Regional Advisory Council that Sitka Tribe works with



### Alaska State Board of Fish

▲ Sitka Tribe also participates in the Board of Fish





# Herring Management

- ▲ Herring are important to STA because they are a rich food source in between the end of winter and beginning of other spring harvests
- ▲ STA helps manage herring by participating the Herring Task Force

# STA Herring History

- ▲ Our "Buffalo"
- ▲ 1997 Tribe is successful in increasing SS escapement threshold from 7500t to 20k
- ▲ 2000 Tribe experiences difficulty in getting roe due to seining activities
- ▲ Present Through the MOA Tribe is considered an active stakeholder during Fisheries and is consulted through out the fishery






# Halibut Management

- ▲ Subsistence Halibut fishing happening since before contact
- ▲ Was illegal till 2002
- ▲ Subsistence Halibut Harvesters are now allowed:
- ▲ 20 halibut per day
- ▲ 30 hooks per skate



#### Subsistence Fisheries

- ▲ Traditional Fisheries predate European contact and current commercial methods are copied from observing traditional fisheries
- ▲ Traps, seines, gillnets, trolling, and longlines are described in historical documents

#### STA Decided to Take a Stand

▲ Initiated proposal to Federal subsistence board and AK board of fish to make the resource and subsistence the priority it was entitled to!



# Accomplishments

A Redoubt received: a management plan with escapement triggers that allowed escapement, subsistence fishing, sport fishing and commercial fishing in that order, and ... A National Award!







#### Sitka Tribes Successes

- ▲ Demanded greater protections with herring conservation through Board process
- ▲ Received customary determinations through Board process
- ▲ Subsistence halibut fishing rights enacted statewide
- ▲ Subsistence priority for sockeye recognized



#### Sitka Tribes Resources

- ▲ Stewardship commitment by Tribe
  - ▲ Not a treaty right
- ▲ Executive Order requires consultation between federal agencies and tribes
  - ▲ Re-affirmed by Pres Bush Oct. 04
- ▲ Work with all governments however we can



#### What do Tribes need

- *▲ Maintain critical habitat* 
  - ▲ Forage species such as herring, sandlance
  - *▲ Juvenile salmonids*
  - ▲ Recognize tribal rights in coastal decision making

Access to culturally important resource when area has protections: (collecting eggs or beaks from Park area)
